# TRAFFICKING IN PERSONS

Human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery that involves exploitation of persons for a benefit-usually money. Everyday women, children and men are bought, sold and transported away from their homes for the purpose of exploitation: sexual exploitation, forced labour, slavery, forced illegal activity, sale of babies and the removal of human organs. Human traffickers prey on the weak. They use creative and sometimes ruthless ploys to trick, coerce, and win the confidence of potential victims.

Trafficking in persons is defined as "the recruiting, transporting, transferring, harboring, providing or receiving of a person for the purpose of exploitation"

No one country including Malaysia, is free from this evil crime against humanity. Its impact on women and children in particular is affront to the core dignity of vulnerable groups of persons. The impact of human trafficking are devastating. Victims may suffer physical and emotional abuse, rape, threats against self and family, and even death. The devastation extends beyond individual victims; human trafficking undermines health, safety, and security of all nations it touches.

Trafficking in persons has become a multibillion dollar business. Next to drug dealing, trafficking of humans is tied with arms dealing as the third largest criminal industry in the world. The United Nations estimates indicate that trafficking in persons generate US40 billion a year for traffickers. The profits are increasing every year as the demand grows.

Due to the clandestine nature of human trafficking, exact estimates are often difficult to obtain. Some

estimates show that every year about 1 million people are trafficked worldwide. Out of these the majority are women and children.

Malaysia's rapid economic growth has inadvertantly brought with it the problems of foreign workers, illegal immigrants, smuggling of migrants and human trafficking. There are more then two million foreign workers in Malaysia, both legal and illegal. Initially, human trafficking in Malaysia appears to be focussed on women and children but now the trend is leaning more towards labour exploitation.

As such, Malaysia is a favourite transit, destination, and to a lesser extent a source country for trafficked people coming mostly from this region. Malaysia entered the global fight against human trafficking when it enacted the Anti-trafficking in Persons Act 2007 (ATIP) which was enforced in 2008 and also drafted the National Action Plan in 2009. These are Malaysia's initial response towards the implementation of the UN Protocol to Prevent, Suppress and Punish Trafficking in Persons, Especially Women and Children, supplementing the UN Convention Against Transnational Organised Crime, of which 117 countries have signed.

The Act provides legal mechanisms for the prosecution of offence of trafficking in persons, the protection and support of trafficked victims, prevention of trafficking in persons. and the establishment of the Anti-trafficking Council under the Ministry of Home Affairs. It is an inter agency Council with representatives from all relevant Ministries as well as NGOs. Recognising the role of NCWO, we have been given a seat on the Council.
